LACEY COMMUNITY MARKET OPENS FOR 2013 SEASON

Eat, shop, play ... stay for the day!

Summer 2013 marks the tenth season the City of Lacey will host a traditional open air market at Huntamer Park. This year, the Lacey Community Market will be held the second Saturday of each month—July 13, August 10, and September 14, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Lacey Community Market offers something for everyone, including seasonal produce and fresh-cut flowers, breads, honey, and locally-made and harvested foods. Other featured items include crafts, hand-made jewelry, furniture, antiques, collectibles, refreshments and local cuisine. Nearly 80 vendors are expected to line the streets for a distinct shopping experience.

"Home and Garden Day"— with a wide array of home and garden vendors and live music— kicks off the market season on July 13. Speakers and demonstrations will

be featured on the hour, every hour. Enjoy the jump swing sounds of 7 on 7, from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

On August 10, come to the market for "Heritage Day" and celebrate the diverse cultural traditions of our community. Entertainment includes a break-dance battle, and the sounds of Correo Aereo and Hot Club Sandwich.

Wrap up the 2013 season on September 14 "Pet Day" with activities, demonstrations, vendors, and services tailored to people and pets. Take advantage of the low-cost pet microchip services and a pet lookalike contest. Visitors will also enjoy music by Cricket on the Hearth and The Wildcat Riders.

LACEY 3RD OF JULY FIREWORKS SPECTACULAR RETURNS

Lacey continues its tradition of kicking off the area's Independence Day celebrations with the Lacey Fireworks Spectacular on Wednesday, July 3. The 15 minute display will be launched from William Bush Park, 4400 Chardonnay Drive NE in Lacey, beginning at 10:15 p.m.

Bush Park will be closed to preserve a safe zone for the fireworks launch; the Spectacular will be visible to most residences located within 3/4 miles. Additionally, the public is invited to view the show from the Lacey Crossroads business area at Yelm Highway and College Street.

Road access in the area will be limited during the event. Yelm Highway SE in the vicinity of Bush Park will be closed at 10 p.m., as will the entrance to the Lacey Crossroads and Lowe's parking lots.

Highway will be closed for approximately one hour to ensure pedestrian safety and to allow fireworks traffic to exit the area following the show. Detour routes for through traffic will be established using 66th Avenue SE, Ruddell Road SE, Mullen Road SE, 37th Avenue SE, and Wiggins Road SE.

CARPENTER ROAD PROJECT RECEIVES AWARD OF EXCELLENCE

The Association of Washington Cities (AWC) has awarded the City of Lacey the AWC Municipal Excellence Award in Public Works for its Carpenter Road Reconstruction project, completed in 2012. Council members Ron Lawson and Cynthia Pratt accepted the award on behalf of the city at the AWC annual conference in Kennewick.

The Association of Washington Cities helps to support cities and towns throughout Washington State. AWC's Municipal Excellence Awards, now in their 23rd year, recognize innovative projects that significantly improve the quality of life for citizens.

The Carpenter Road Reconstruction Project involved the total reconstruction of a one-mile, north-south section of roadway between Pacific Avenue and Martin Way. It features amenities such as quiet asphalt, four traffic lanes with center-turn pockets, bike lanes, sidewalks, landscaped planter strips containing more than 260 street trees and 3,900 accent plantings, and new street lighting. Work also included installation of a reclaimed water main, relocation of a sanitary sewer lift station, undergrounding of overhead utility lines, traffic signal improvements at Pacific Avenue and Martin Way, and wetland restoration at Woodland Creek Community Park. In addition, antiquated culverts at the roadway's Lake Lois crossing were replaced with a large arch-style culvert that will allow for easier passage of fish.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Sewer main repair project

Repairs and replacement to sections of sewer main are to take place on Stockton Street SE near the intersections with 58th Avenue SE and 61st Avenue SE in the Lakepointe neighborhood, and on Ingleside Loop SE in the Avonlea neighborhood. No interruptions to sewer service are anticipated during the estimated three week work period, which began the last week of June.

Yelm sidewalk construction

The City of Lacey is installing a new sidewalk connection, undergrounding overhead utility lines, and constructing roadway improvements, with work expected to be completed in September. Temporary lane closures and delays are expected throughout the project.

There will be temporary lane closures on Yelm Highway in the vicinity of Chambers Prairie Elementary School and Capital City Apartments. The entrance to Crimson Court and Turf Apartments will also be affected.

Waterline replacement and transmission main project

The City of Lacey is installing a new water transmission main from 7945 Pacific Avenue SF to 7431 Pacific Avenue SE, continuing through the end of August. Work is also being done in the Sky Ridge and Fir Park neighborhoods during this time. Temporary lane closures and delays are expected throughout the project.

Areas in the Sky Ridge neighborhood affected include 10th Avenue SE, 11th Avenue SE, 13th Avenue SE, Alice Court SE, and Irene Street SE. Those in the Fir Park area affected include Fir Park Drive SE and 13th Avenue SE.



LACEY NAMES 2013 HISTORIAN OF THE YEAR

Longtime Lacey Museum volunteer Susan Goff was recently named as the city's 2013 Historian of the Year by Mayor Vigil Clarkson and the Lacey City Council. Lacey's Historical Commission unanimously approved Goff's nomination in recognition of her decades-long support of the museum, where she began as a volunteer cataloging historical photos in 1987.

Over those years, Goff, who holds a diploma in Cultural Conservation, was responsible for creating the museum's indexing system for photographs and

negatives, conducting historical research, and assisting with exhibit design. She has also donated many locally-significant items to the museum's collections.

The award was made during the city's observance of Lacey History Month. Several community members have received the honor over the last decade, including Goff's daughter, Andrea Taylor.

FREE SUMMER YOUTH LUNCH PROGRAM

The Lacey Summer Lunch Program will provide free lunches to youth and children, from June 24 through August 16. Nutritious meals will be served at three locations—Lydia Hawk Elementary, Pleasant Glade Elementary, and Mountain View Elementary—each weekday (closed July 4), from 12 noon to 12:30 p.m., with a snack served from 3 to 3:30 p.m. Meals will be made available at no charge to attending children, 18 years of age and younger.

Over the past twenty years, the City of Lacey Parks and Recreation Department, in partnership with NTPS, has sponsored the Summer Lunch Program. The program began in 1993, at Mountain

View Elementary and has since expanded to three sites, selected by percentage of students receiving free or reduced lunches during the school year. This program is made possible by a grant from U.S. Department of Agriculture Child Nutrition Program, North Thurston Public Schools (NTPS), the City of Lacey, and generous donations from the community.

The Playground Pals program offers free activities, arts and crafts, games, fitness, and summer reading program at each site from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m., following daily lunch service.

MOBILE DENTAL CLINIC ROLLS IN TO LACEY THIS SUMMER



Providing dental services to children with limited family income

The Washington Dental Service Foundation (WDSF) SmileMobile will be rolling into town this summer and will be here for just under two weeks, from July 15 through July 26 at Lydia Hawk Elementary School, 7600 5th Avenue in Lacey. Appointments must be scheduled before July 12.

The SmileMobile is a fully equipped mobile dental clinic that provides dental

care to children (birth through high school) with limited family income. They accept the Washington State DSHS ProviderOne Services Card and have a sliding fee scale based on family income.

The SmileMobile is operated by WDSF in partnership with Seattle Children's Hospital.
